## Message from the Chair



It has been a very busy time for the Trust and much has been accomplished over the past year, since our last newsletter in February 2016. We have much to celebrate and many to applaud as we share this update with our members and community partners.

Honouring our volunteers and supporters has always been important. We've had a few events and occasions this year to mark special appreciation from the Trust. St. Margaret's Bay's first forest ranger Ralph Wheadon certainly was one of them, as he was honoured with a surprise recognition event on June 25<sup>th</sup> at

the Estabrooks Hall with his family, friends and community. A section of the trail is now officially designated as the Ralph Wheadon Trail. See details page 4.

Our Trust Board volunteers joined more than 250 people for MLA Iain Rankin's (Timberlea-Prospect) evening of community celebration and commemoration August 25<sup>th</sup> at the Halifax Exhibition Centre in Goodwood. Iain hosted this special event to publically recognize the enormous contribution made to the community by its volunteers. So glad we were proudly a part of it. See story page 5.

Cyclists were officially welcomed to the wilderness area trails in October with a celebration ribbon-cutting and bike ride event to mark the NS Environment decision to allow all bikers on the hard-packed trails already in use by ATVs. See story page 5.

The Nine Mile River Bridge project is almost completed with a new steel structure being assembled and installed sometime this month. This five-year project, led by Mike Marriott and his crew of helpful volunteers many from the local Safety-Minded ATV Association, will allow trail users safe access for many years to come. #### **Ralph Wheadon Celebration Announces Trail Naming in His Honour**

St. Margaret's Bay's first forest ranger and long-time, Trust advisor Ralph Wheadon (87 years old) was taken by complete surprise when he arrived at the special event held in his honour on June 25th at the Estabrooks Hall. Surrounded by his family, friends and colleagues, Ralph learned that the Trust and the Province were naming a trail section, from the entrance to the wilderness area south of Long Lake to the intersection with the Old St. Margaret's Bay Road, as the Ralph Wheadon Trail. Back in the day, Ralph had been involved in building the fire road from the cul-de-sac at Joshua Slocum Avenue to the intersection of Old St. Margaret's Bay Road, among many other projects.

At the celebration, Ralph enjoyed sharing stories about his work in what is now the wilderness area. The Lewis Lake Fire Depot, which was built in 1955, assigned

Ralph as its first permanent Forest Ranger. "Back in those days," Ralph explained, "fires continued at the rate of 100-250 per year and I had to work on or investigate each of them. I grabbed whomever I could to help fight fires, whether during the day or through the night."

Ralph indicated that he was also responsible for the payrolls of local fire departments (10 at the time) and upgrading connector roads throughout the Five Bridge wilderness area to access fires. Ralph commented that "eventually a permanent building, bunkhouse and kitchen, with a cook for the fire season, grew at Lewis Lake. We had Ranger school students and first year Forestry students from Fredericton help make up the work force." Congratulations again Ralph!

## **Establishment of a Wilderness Helipad Site**

John Bignell, Trust Board volunteer and paramedic with NS Emergency Health Services, has been working with the Province to establish a designated helicopter landing location within the Five Bridges Wilderness Area. This landing location would be the province's first one designated within a wilderness area. It could play a crucial role in how emergency services respond to an accident within the remote area.

Mike Marriot, President of the Safety-Minded ATV Association and Trust Board volunteer, organized a tour through the area on June 13<sup>th</sup>. Members of the ATV Association arrived with nine ATVs to escort Gerhardt Meintjes, EHS Captain and Base Flight Safety Officer, and other Trust Board volunteers Beth McGee, Peter Lund and John through the stretch of 19 km trail to view potential helipad locations.

The story was covered by CBC Nova Scotia where Mike Marriott gave an interview explaining the importance of this decision. Mike believes, "there needs to be a faster way to get people out of the remote areas in an emergency, especially now that the trail near Head of St. Margaret's Bay is growing in popularity. Right now it could take two to three hours to reach someone who is injured and another two to three hours to get them out. If a helipad was established, they would still have to get in but they could then pick them up and they'd be at the hospital probably within 10 to 15 minutes."

John has since met with the Province and EHS Lifeflight, and it seems everyone is in agreement. Final planning is underway and hopefully a new helipad site will be designated and operational by summer 2017.

## Nine Mile River Bridge

A new bridge across the Nine Mile River is about to be installed -- a real milestone that will allow trail users to connect from Goodwood to Glen Margaret and Tantallon including 22 km of managed trail in the Five Bridge Wilderness Area and hundreds of km of connecting trails via the Old St. Margaret's Bay Road, Old Coach Road, Old Halifax Road, Lewis Lake Fire Road, ATV connector trail and the St. Margaret's Bay Rails to Trails to the North, which allows for province-wide trail connections. Steel pieces have been delivered to the site and assembly and installation of the steel is completed, lumber and hardware will be installed this month and weather permitting, the new bridge will be in place by the end of the month. This new structure will make it safer for trail users for years to come and has been 5-years in the making.

Project manager and Trust Board volunteer Mike Marriott (also President of the local Safety-Minded ATV Association) has led this initiative and spent countless hours with other club volunteers getting to this final phase. Funding was provided through a Connect2 Grant, Off Highway Vehicle Infrastructure Fund, the Bay Treasure Chest, HRM Councillor Matt Whitman, Prospect Road Recreation Association, ATV Association of NS, National Trails Coalition and Health Promotion and Protection.

Special thanks to Iain Rankin (MLA Timberlea-Prospect), ATVANS/ trails coordinator Corey Robar and our local Safety-Minded ATV Association members. Without everyone's contribution of time and effort, this trail improvement would never have been achieved.



## **Reprinting the Walking Guide**

A second-edition reprint of the *Walking Guide to the Old St. Margaret's Bay Road* is underway. It contains updated maps and information to guide trail users who wish to explore the wilderness area with some history and landmarks identified along the way. Trust Board volunteers Barb Allen, Beth McGee, with the support of many, are leading the project. When it is printed, the guide will be shared broadly with libraries, schools, and local community groups to educate and further promote the wilderness area. Funding has been provided by HRM Community Grants, St. Margaret's Bay Regional Tourism Development Association, Reg Rankin (former HRM Councillor), and Bay Treasure Chest. A huge thanks to everyone who contributed new GPS coordinates to help with updates.

## Bay Treasure Chest – Big Thank you

Through the Bay Treasure Chest funding, the Trust has been able to accomplish activities that would otherwise remain on our wish lists. Trail improvements including adding gravel bedding on trails, signage markers, film segments from the wilderness area, and hiring communications support are just a few of the ways we've been able to use the funds and improve the workings of the Trust and its volunteers.
